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Context

- In 2018, the University of Sunderland was among only five universities to open a School of Medicine in a bid to address the regional imbalance of medical education places across England.
- The School aims to widen access to ensure the profession reflects the needs of the communities it serves, as well as addressing the chronic shortage of GPs in the North East.
- In recent years only 4% of undergraduate medical students at universities across the country came from the North East. The region also has the highest number of schools never to have sent any students to study medicine.
- The University committed to recruiting students from a widening participation background. A target of 15% WP recruitment was set, with the School ultimately attracting 25% in its first cohort in 2019/20.

Pre-16 outreach to support our School of Medicine

- Designed a suite of interactive outreach activities, accessible to the very youngest pupils in early years education right through to Year 11.
- Hands-on and inspirational, linked to the National Curriculum, introducing the role of doctors and the equipment they use in their day-to-day job.
- The team purchased medical equipment including reflex hammers, stethoscopes, slings, bandages, anatomical models, fake tongues and even fake eyeballs!



The beginnings of Mini Medics Boxed

- March 2020; no explanation required
- Development of online school outreach activities.
- Outreach resources delivered to schools
- £2,000 Amazon funding bid in October 2020
- Uni Connect & institutional funding



Online working challenges

- Sourcing medical supplies; pandemic inflated costs vs maintaining the integrity of the resources box
- Delivery and storage of purchased items whilst working remotely
- Development of accompanying resources; workbooks and answer booklets

The University of Sunderland's School of Medicine

What is the University of Sunderland's School of Medicine?

The University of Sunderland's School of Medicine is part of the Government's plan to make Sunderland a key player in its biggest ever increase of the medical workforce. The Government has set into motion a plan to create five new medical schools to help us deal with the challenges of a continuously growing population; a population where in 10 years' time, we will have around one million more over 75 year olds. The new School of Medicine will also prove a huge boost to our region, both in terms of the economy and healthcare treatments, with thousands of NHS patients set to benefit.


The Government's medical schools are being set up in areas of the country where it can be difficult to recruit and attract new doctors. The Department of Health and Social Care (DHSC) aims to increase medical applicants from all types of backgrounds as part of their bid to tackle social injustices. There is evidence that doctors tend to remain in the areas they trained in.

The University of Sunderland is a leading university in terms of widening access and participation. The University has been identified as a university which will work closely with the local community to help talented students from groups under-represented in higher education become doctors. The aim of widening access to the field of medicine, is to ultimately ensure that medicine and related professions reflect the population they serve.

What does the University of Sunderland's School of Medicine offer its students?

Medical students learn in the University of Sunderland's existing Health Sciences teaching and learning space, which includes outstanding facilities, real-life settings and the latest simulation equipment.

Our Sciences Complex offers one of the best student experiences for those studying the sciences, including industry-standard research and teaching laboratories and testing equipment in pharmaceutical, biomedical, environmental and sports sciences. The non-clinical components of the course are based here.
