Developing a Culturally Sensitive Curriculum

This event will share findings on a collaborative research project with NERUPI, in conjunction with the University of Kent and several other member institutions, to develop and trial a Culturally Sensitive Curriculum Scale (CSCS). Created by Dr Dave S. P. Thomas and Professor Kathleen M. Quinlan, this tool aims to measure students' perceptions of how culturally sensitive their curriculum is. We will explore how the CSCS can be used to learn more about students' experiences of their curriculum and the impact on their studies, and how it can help to identify and highlight what actions should be taken to remove the degree awarding gap in higher education.
