A partnership approach to early literacy attainment raising with unaccompanied minors

Liz Ferguson, University of East Anglia (UEA)

Liz has worked in several different roles in UEA's Outreach team. In recent years she has focused on widening participation activities for especially under-represented groups including students with experience of local authority care, estranged students, and forced migrant students. Liz coordinates the Care Experienced & Estranged Student Network at UEA, offering practical information and support to current undergraduates studying with limited family support. Liz is Chair of the eastern region group of the National Network for the Education of Care Leavers (NNECL).

Uncovering partnership working's hidden benefits – collaboration and co-creation with UCL Careers Extra students

Penny Longman, University College London



Penny is a Senior Careers Consultant and leads the UCL Careers Extra programme of enhanced careers support for undergraduates from underrepresented backgrounds. Before joining UCL she was responsible for higher education and careers guidance in a school and 6th form college. She undertook a master's researching students' and graduates' perceptions of the benefits of Higher Education participation in the context of increased

emphasis on graduate employability but widely acknowledged inequality of access to graduate positions. Her MA dissertation focused on factors which enable young people to make the most of university, barriers they may face and implications for practice.

Museum's Preservative Party to co-produce histories of women and energy in the home. She is responsible for leading 3 key projects to support young people and their teachers via art history; Discover ARTiculation, Discovery Days, and Plan, Prepare, Provide.
